In closing I wish to share with you the beautiful Tohu or image of a Moko Kauae that was gifted to us by artist Jim Wiki from Te Aupōuri:



The moko kauae (female chin tattoos) is traditionally acquired by women on the basis of their mana, established through their whakapapa. To receive such design is an honour to the wearer, their iwi, hapū and whanau. It is a connection to our ancestors in knowing where we come from and allows a directive path of where we are going. As a right of Māori women to wear such design, moko kauae is extremely sacred. In this context, this design represents the importance of Mana Wahine (prestigious strong women) and the opportunities they embrace. The design shows two face coming together as one to share and pursue knowledge

This is also represented by the three points depicting Ngā Kete o the Wānanga or the three baskets of knowledge.

Management Portfolio

There have been a number of efficiencies gained within the administration management area during 2018 including a rationalisation of our IT system. While we continue to maintain ACT!, all files and communications have been transferred to our computer system based at the office of the Trust Manager and is accessible to all Trustees. Learning another pathway for communicating has been easy and seamless with support from our provider and Trust Manager. All Trustees now have an @newhorizonsforwomen.org.nz email address meaning emails on behalf of the Trust are not sent from personal /work email addresses. We continue to use Zoom for monthly meetings which allows us to connect remotely reducing travel.

The website has been constantly updated with new information although there is still work to be done to streamline the awards process. The applications site is cumbersome for those assisting the Trust in allocating awards and whilst we are keen to develop a more up to date approach, a lack of finances continues to restrict this development.

There have been fewer Trustees covering the governance and management of the organization during this year. We have altered the Constitution to fit this new way of working. Further work has also been undertaken to ensure that the spirit of the Treaty of Waitangi is encapsulated in our Constitution.

The careful stewardship of the funds received from past bequests and donations is a priority for the Trust. They were given with the intention of funding future awards and we have invested them in order to generate income to use to make awards and administer the Trust. In recent years the investment income has decreased because of the low interest rates. In 2018 the Trust again established a relationship with Craigs Investment Partners to advise on investments and maximize investment income. The anticipated low interest income for some years means decreasing the amount of awards paid or decreasing the capital of the funds. To minimize this, we will continue to strive to be prudent and efficient in all our activities.



In 2018 we were able to keep the administration costs down thanks to the generosity of others. Thank you to BGI Wellington and the Teachers Education Union who have allowed us to use their meeting rooms and facilities. Thank you to AUT, Wintec, Te Puni Kōkiri, Graduate Women Otago, Rukuhia Branch Rural Women and Milson Women Institute who all donated venues, food and volunteers to make the award ceremonies possible.




Applicants and Awardees Portfolio


As the new lead for the Applications and Awards portfolio, I wish to acknowledge the leadership of Lynda Garrett within the portfolio. As a new Trustee, her ongoing guidance and support have been an immense help as I have transitioned into this role. I am pleased to report on a very positive year for our portfolio team, as we have focused on making the application process more streamlined and efficient.

We have made changes to further streamline the award application process. Our Trust Manager has done a lot of work on our website and supporting information to ensure that the application process is simple, the requirements of various awards are clear and access is as easy as possible. We are now seeking funding to improve the application website we use to make the on-line application process easier for applicants in future years.



As there has been less interest income earned from past bequests and donations to fund awards directly, we would like to acknowledge the increased contribution from sponsors enabling the Trust to support a comparable amount of women in 2018. We continue to appreciate ongoing and valued support from our sponsors who through their awards, continue to inspire women to create new horizons through education and research

In 2018 the Trust offered a total of 42 awards, a small decrease in the number of awards made in the previous 2 years. These consisted of 26 second-chance education awards, 5 research awards and 11 specific purpose awards, offering an increasingly diverse range of support available to applicants.





We also note that most applications are from Wellington and Auckland with less from other main cities with universities and polytechnic institutions and very few from the provinces. We have and will endeavour to ensure that women from across the country are aware of the available awards and encourage applications from all.

The award ceremonies are always inspirational events that enable us to hear firsthand about the difference we are all contributing to. The Trust offered award ceremonies in Otago, Wellington, Manawatu, Waikato and Auckland in 2018, acknowledging awardees achievements in the company of their whānau, sponsors and supporters of the Trust.

Awardees are asked to provide a progress report at the end of the year to let us know how they progressed in their study, research or projects. The progress reports from 2018 awardees tell us that applicants appreciate the flexibility in how they use the awards to support their study. Many used the money to pay for childcare, getting the car fixed and parking costs so they could attend placements for their course. Recipients also talk about the awards often being the first time that they have been acknowledged or received any support to pursue an education pathway.

Most of the awards we offer are for second-chance education, women who are taking up or returning to study later in life. Quite often we are impressed by the long education journeys many of these women have undertaken to achieve their goals. Some start with foundation certificates and then progress to diplomas and degrees to gain their desired qualifications. Long study programmes and age can prevent women from accessing student loans and we are impressed with the amount of women working to sustain themselves and their families while studying full-time.

The decision to change my vocation and pursue my goal to become a registered nurse forced a huge drop in our family income and increased our outgoings.

As well as moving to a city from the rural surroundings so I could study, our priorities, lifestyle and family time changed. Many days/weeks were

consumed with study, assignments or placements separating our family unit. Being a mature student, 45+, I had exceeded my allocated study weeks and no longer qualified for student allowance as I started my last year of study. We approached Income Support but were declined assistance as our assets were too high, even though we were cash poor.

The Award from NHWT:HK was received with open arms as it gave us a glimmer of hope and relief. It was lovely to be recognised for my efforts and the money reduced some bills and keep the wolf from the door. Thank you

The specific purpose awards are designed to encourage women to participate in study in fields where women are under-represented, where different cultures are under-represented or in projects that benefit women and girls in New Zealand. In 2018 the first AWIS STEM awards were offered for women studying in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics sponsored by the Association of Women in the Sciences. We received a lot of applications for this inaugural award and were pleased to support three awardees at different stages of their studies. Two women again received Outward Bound awards that offered them an experience that tested them and prepared them for their next study and career steps.

I will be striving to continue to improve myself so that I may become better than the person that I was yesterday. I will continue to challenge myself and push the boundaries of my comfort zone and step into my challenge zone where I truly grow as a person and learn the most about myself and my limitations.

Outward Bound taught me that the boundaries of what I can do are far beyond what I thought and I am still yet to find the boundary of what I'm capable of. It is exciting and enticing prospect to know that you are capable of more than you ever thought possible.

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Sponsors, Donors and Promotions Portfolio

The generous support of our sponsors, donors and friends enables New Horizons for Women: Hine Kahukura to continue to do its valuable work inspiring and enabling women and girls to create new horizons through education and research via its awards programme.

Substantial historic bequests and donations underpin our investments programme, generating interest income that is used to fund awards each year. As well as awards funded by donations, a significant number of awards are sponsored each year.

Sponsored awards make up the majority of awards offered in 2018, with a record 32 sponsored of the 42 awards made. These ranged in value from \$1,000 to \$15,000. Sponsored awards are often targeted to a specific geographical area or study discipline which we welcome. Via an administration fee, sponsors also contribute to the costs of administering the awards.

While receive some valued awards sponsorship from individuals, most are made by philanthropic trusts and community organisations. We would like to acknowledge our oldest on-going sponsors, Graduate Women Wellington, who have sponsored a range of awards through the Trust since 1998. We are pleased that so many sponsors continue to support this work each year as we know that there are increasing demands on organisation's funds and less interest are being generated as income.

We are always thrilled to receive new sponsorships resulting from a fundraising event or new contact in the community. In 2018, the Association of Women in the Sciences held their national quiz for the second time and again raised \$9,000 to fund AWIS science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) awards in the coming year. Toi Ohomai Institute of Technology held a charity golf tournament in Rotorua that raised \$20,000 to which will be used to fund nine awards in the coming award round.

Sponsors are invited to the award ceremonies with many attending in person to present their awards. The Trust feel it is important to acknowledge the source of each award and awardees benefit from knowing who is supporting their study and research efforts. We enjoy linking sponsors and awardees and keep our sponsors informed of the progress of women who receive their award each year. The appreciation and gratitude was evident from all the progress reports received from awardees this year.



Statement of Service Performance

New Horizons for Women Trust For the year ended 31 December 2018

Outcomes

In 2018 New Horizons for Women Trust: Hine Kahukura continued to support the education and training of women as well as providing opportunities for research relating to women in Aotearoa New Zealand. The financial awards administered by the Trust in 2018 have assisted women to undertake study, partake of training and carry out research. In many cases this provides them with the ability to sustain themselves in their chosen careers.

Awardees provide progress reports. The progress reports received in 2018 inform us the awards have been of great benefit and have supported the recipients in their studies, research and personal development.

The number of applications received in 2018 has decreased from recent years. However, the number of applications still exceeds the awards available and indicates to the Trust that there continues to be a need for financial support while undertaking study, development or research.



Statement of Accounting Policies

New Horizons for Women Trust For the year ended 31 December 2018

Basis of Preparation

The entity has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is not registered for GST. Therefore all amounts are stated inclusive of GST (if any).

Income Tax

New Horizons for Women Trust is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Revenue

Revenue from Grants and Donations are recognised as revenue as received unless there is an obligation to return the funds if conditions of the grant are not met. If there is such an obligation, the grant is initially recorded as a liability and recognised as revenue when conditions of the grant are satisfied.

Interest Income is recorded as it is earned during the year.

Investments

Investments comprise investments in term deposits with banks that have maturities greater than 12 months and listed bonds.

Listed bonds are initially recorded at the cost. On an annual basis the market price is determined and the investment is revalued to the market price. Changes in revaluations are recorded through the Statement of Financial Performance.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is recorded at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset if it is probable that future economic benefit or service potential associated with the item will flow to the Trust and the cost of an item can be measured reliably. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount of the asset. Gains and losses on disposals are included in the Statement of Financial Performance. Report on the Performance Report

Opinion

GENERAL ACCUMULATED FUNDS

General Fund

The *General Fund* is used to record the receipts and payments for the overall running of the Trust and to hold funds for special purposes not covered by any other fund. There are currently no special purposes subfunds of the General Fund, and so the General Fund is effectively the *Administration Fund*.

The receipts of the *General Fund* include the administration contributions from sponsors of awards, and an allocation of interest earnings of the *General & Awards Funds* and of the *Special Restricted Purposes Funds*, and an allocation of unspecified donations.

Decisions on allocations from unspecified donations are made by the Trust Board at the end of each financial year. In general, all donations for the general purposes of the Trust (excluding any donations or sponsorship for specific funds or purposes) are allocated to the *General Fund* and the *NHWT Endowment Fund* (Note 6).

Investment Revaluation Reserve (Note 6)

GENERAL PURPOSES FUNDS (ENDOWMENT FUNDS)

These are funds for general or non-specific purposes, defined as **Endowment Funds** in the notes for the Annual Return required from all registered charities.

General Purposes Fund - NHWT Endowment Fund

The NHWT Endowment Fund was established from donations to provide income earning capital for any aspects of the Trust's work.

Margaret (Peg) Mary Hutchison signed the Trust Deed in 1991 and was the Trust's Treasurer until 2007. The bequest of \$100,000 for general purposes received from her after her death in 2008 and donations in her memory are held within the NHWT Endowment Fund. A Second Chance Award and a Career Change Award are currently named after her.

The subfund called the *NHWT Endowment Earnings Fund* shows the earnings of the *NHWT Endowment Fund* and how these are used for the NHWT Awards, for general administration and possibly for inflation adjustment of the capital fund. The earnings fund should have a balance of zero at the end of each financial year.

Special General Purposes Fund - Alexandra Kilpatrick Fund

In 2014 the Trust received \$500,000, the major part of a very generous bequest from Alexandra Kilpatrick of Nelson. The bequest is to be used for general purposes to further second chance education for women. The first awards from this fund were made in 2015 and were named the *Alexandra Kilpatrick Second Chance Awards*.

Additional Information (unaudited) continued

RESTRICTED PURPOSES FUNDS

The **Special Restricted Purposes Funds** have been created as separate subfunds for special purposes (usually as funding for named awards) by specific arrangements agreed with the donors or fundraisers of these funds.

Dawn & Arthur Ibbotson Second Chance Awards Fund

This fund was donated by Dawn Ibbotson and provides two Second Chance Awards every year (currently one Foundation Studies Award and one Degree/Diploma Award).

Ria McBride Research Award Fund

This fund was created by family and friends of Ria McBride to fund a biennial research award in her memory. Donations continue. The Ria McBride Research Award alternates with the Janus - 1995 NGO Research Award .

Janus - 1995 NGO Research Award Fund

According to the Memorandum of Understanding the Trust made in 2009 with the Janus Trust and the NGO Display Trust, this fund was created from the monies donated by those two Trusts when wound up. The Janus Trust money was received in 2008 and the NGO Display Trust money in 2009. The interest earned by the fund is used for a biennial Janus - 1995 NGO Research Award, which alternates with the Ria McBride Research Award.

Margaret Shields / SROW Research Award Fund

The fund includes \$46,000 received from the now disbanded **Society for Research on Women** (\$24,000 from **SROW Christchurch** and \$11,000 from **SROW Wellington** in 1999, and a further \$11,000 in 2001 from **SROW Wellington**) to generate income for research awards. In the event of the Trust being wound up, these sums are to be paid to the University of Canterbury (\$24,000) and the Victoria University of Wellington (\$22,000) for the provision of a similar award.

Margaret L Bailey Science Award Fund

This fund for an award in science was started by Margaret L Bailey (a former Trustee) in 2012. She will continue to add to this fund until it becomes large enough to have both a capital and an earnings fund. In the meantime, she is sponsoring one award each year. The inaugural award was made in 2013.

Teupoko'ina Utanga Morgan Memorial Award Fund

In 2012 Anau Ako Pasifika Incorporated donated the major part of its remaining funds to NHWT on the understanding that the money would be used either for Second Chance Awards for women of Pacific descent to study early childhood education, or for awards for innovation in Pacific early childhood education. The inaugural innovation awards were made in 2013.

The donors asked that the award be named after Teupoko'ina Utanga Morgan who was the director of Anau Ako Pasifika Incorporated from its inception in the early 1980s until her retirement. She was an early NHWT Trustee (appointed 1992), was highly respected as an advocate for women's leadership issues and was awarded a QSM for services to the community in 1986. Anau Ako Pasifika Incorporated was supported in its establishment by the Bernard Van Leer Foundation in the Netherlands.

Additional Information (unaudited) continued

Sonja Davies Peace Award Fund

According to the Memorandum of Understanding with the fundraising group together with its Addendum of March 2007, this capital fund consists of the amount in the Sonja Davies Peace Award Fund at 31 December 2006 PLUS any further donations made to this fund. Currently one award of \$4,000 is made each year.

AWARDS FUND (LIABILITY)

Awards Funds Carried Forward - Liability (Note 4)

The balance left in the awards funds provided by the State Services Commission and by any award sponsors or donors, which are not spent in the current year are held as a liability for paying out in subsequent years.

Ria McBride Public Service Management Awards (Note 4)

The funds provided for this award each year are from the State Services Commission. The recipients claim study expenses from their award and if they do not use these funds, the funds are liable to be returned to the State Services Commission.

Sponsored Awards (Note 4)

This fund is used to record the receipts from sponsors of awards, **except** for the funds from the State Services Commission. The payments are awards and related expenses paid out from these sponsorships and donations.
