Nominating Survey

The trust is run by Trustees who work voluntarily. We presently have 8 trustees who live and work throughout New Zealand. The Nominating Organisations that are represented are: NZ Federation of Women's Institutes, NZ Federation of Graduate Women, PACIFICA, YWCA of Aoteroa /New Zealand and Zonta International District 16.

As you are aware trustees have been nominated onto NHWT by nominating organisations. Once Trustees are selected for the board, it is expected that their important task is to manage the business of the trust utilising their personal skill sets. While trustees may wish to make reports back to their nominating organisations about the work of the trust, their primary work as a trustee is to apply their governance skills to ensuring that the NHWT strategic goals are met.

The review also gave NHWT trustees a good process forward. A clear transparent nomination process will be developed for nominating organisations, other women's organisations and women who wish to self-nominate. This process includes circulating a 'needs' profile to Nominating Organisations who can then either identify or endorse candidates from their organisations. Self-nomination will also be an option. However any self-nominating candidate will need to demonstrate a strong evidence of understanding women's issues, have excellent governance skills and have clear networks that link to NHWT. The review also highlighted the need to have strong on-going communication between NHWT and nominating organisations. Utilising nominating organisations' newsletters and creating our own will be one of the communication strategies that we will use.

Monica Hissink Award

Monica Brody neé Hissink was a signatory on the NHW Trust Deed.

Monica headed the Wellington BPW group who wished to commemorate the work of Rita King by offering second chance education, of which Monica was a passionate supporter. Sadly Monica died in November 2011. She had always said she would like to give a donation to the Trust and her husband Mike honoured that wish with a very generous donation. We thank Mike for his generosity and wish him well as he travels back to live in the UK.

Monica was a member of Wellington BPW and a librarian at the then Department of Scientific and Industrial Research. When I met her, she was involved in coordinating the libraries of the various sections of the DSIR into a main library that served the newly formed Ministry of Science. When Rita King OBE died in 1988, Monica headed a Wellington BPW committee that wished to commemorate Rita's work, particularly that involving her leadership in the fight for equal pay and opportunities for women. The committee proposed that each of the clubs in the NZ Federation raise \$1000. This money would form the capital base for a Trust that would provide scholarships for second chance education. At the time of this initiative, I was publicity chair of the Federation and editor of the national magazine "Speak Up". Monica asked me to include an article so that the NZ wide membership would know of this proposal prior to the annual conference. Unfortunately, the proposal was rejected. However, Monica and her committee were undeterred and when they heard that women from the Society for Research on Women and representatives of the 1975 Women's Conference wished to fund second chance education and research awards, they decided to join forces. This was the beginning of what became known as the New Horizons for Women Trust. Monica and her husband, Mike Brodie, shifted to Pitlochry, Scotland in the 1990s and Monica

again worked as a librarian and she and Mike were involved in the Scottish independence movement. Alan and I visited them in July 1997. Monica and Mike later returned to NZ living in Katikati where she and Mike were involved in a kiwifruit farm. Valerie Rhodes

Valerie was the inaugural Chair of NHW and held the position for nine years.

The Monica Hissink Award will be for a second chance awardee and presented in 2012.
