The 10th Second Chance Group Preloved fashion sale was held on Saturday 29 March 2014 at the Wesley Church Hall in Taranaki St, Wellington City which has been the venue for the last 4 years having outgrown the original venue. To date almost 30 women have received education awards and over \$75,000 has been raised and donated.

Another successful event was organised this year by the small group of volunteers of whom some have been involved since the first sale in 2005. The volunteer numbers swell to almost 40 on sale day and include members of the NHWT as well as Zonta Wellington and others interested in supporting the cause and wanting to have some fun for a few hours!

To demonstrate the nature and flavour of the sale event itself it is worth sharing this story with you all. Two friends Nicky Jenkin and Michelle Tuffrey have been attending the sale for ten and nine years respectively so Nicky has attended every sale despite now living in Hawkes Bay and Michelle who lives in Wellington has

Research Spotlight

It is always fascinating to learn a little bit more about some of our past awardees, what their passions are and how they have put their award money to good use.

Here Sarah Baird outlines her research into breast cancer development.

Halting breast cancer development in its tracks

Imagine if we could stop breast cancer developing at all? If when it was first detected, we could take a drug which would immediately stop its progress, so that it never got to the stage of harming the patient? This is the eventual goal of one of the research projects being carried out in my lab at the University of Otago. I have been employed there as a Lecturer in the Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology for the past 3 years. I arrived with a 5 month old daughter, and have had another period of maternity leave since. My job at the University is all I could hope for: with both research and teaching in the mix, it is busy, hectic, stimulating, exciting. I have the chance to contribute in terms of new knowledge and potential cancer therapies and in terms of passing on knowledge and enthusiasm to students. Finding enough time and money to carry out the research part of the job and get a foot in the door in terms of publications is a challenge we all face. Last year, I was fortunate enough to be awarded the NZ Federation of Graduate Women Wellington Branch Research Award.

This award was given to me to complete a first publication in an area that may lead to a new approach to cancer therapy. We are looking at how bone marrow cells, the mesenchymal stem cells (MSCs) are attracted to breast cancer sites. The MSCs home from the bone marrow to anywhere in the body where there is injury, inflammation or cancer. Once they arrive at the cancer, they form part of the tumour mass and influence how it behaves. In general, the MSCs are believed to promote further tumour growth, in other words, to be harmful to the patient in the long term. The tumour mass is not only made up of the cancer cells and the MSCs. There are also white blood cells, blood vessels and a number of other cell types too. If this supportive tumour mass around the cancer cells does not develop, then the cancer cells cannot continue to grow and will never reach the stage of causing illness or death. We reasoned, therefore, that disrupting that building up of the tumour mass, by halting the homing of MSCs to the area, would stop tumour development before it even really started.

First we needed to understand what attracts the MSCs to the cancer site, and this research project is a step in that direction. So far we have identified a protein that appears to be responsible for three quarters of the MSC movement towards the breast cancer cells. This is Cathepsin D, a protein that cuts through the structural network surrounding the cancer, allowing the MSCs access to the cancer site. We are now examining which form of Cathepsin D has this role and are looking to see whether its cutting activity is crucial or whether it is acting in other ways.

Some very interesting results have been obtained since gaining the Research Award. I have been able to order purified protein versions of the active Cathepsin D, complete with cutting activity, and its precursor form, Procathepsin D. There is some published literature in an area related to this, looking at the influence of Cathepsin D on the movement of the cancer cells themselves in advanced cancer. These researchers have concluded that the cutting activity is not important at all and instead it is the Procathepsin D molecule which has the determining role.

Sarah Baird was the recipient of the 2013 Wellington Area, New Zealand Federation of Graduate Women Research Award for her ground-breaking breast cancer research at the University of Otago.

Ross Craig, Chair of the Trust sadly died last month. Ross was a great supporter of second chance education for women and was always a very willing presenter of the award at the Auckland Award Ceremony giving encouragement and advice to the recipients. He will be very much missed.
