Dawn has been active in voluntary and governance organisations – particularly those which advocate for the empowerment of women for much of her adult life. She is a life member of National Council of Women and a member of NZ Federation of Graduate Women. She is a former member of the Otago Polytechnic Council, was the first woman on Dunedin Teacher's College Council and Deputy

Chair of Knox College Council. Along with Arthur she was a keen tramper and member of the NZ Alpine Club.

For the past 30 years Dawn has made and sold gift cards using dried flowers from her garden, raising over \$60,000 for a variety of charitable organisations. Every year Dawn presents her award - for the last few years this has been at the Dunedin Ceremony. She is an inspiration to us all and the Trust wishes her a wonderful 100th birthday and look forward to her continued presence at the award ceremonies.

Award Ceremony Highlights

As always, the highlight of the NHWT Calendar is the annual awards ceremonies. It is a great opportunity for the board of trustees, its sponsors and supporters to meet our awardees in person and to hear their stories. It is an honour and a pleasure to present the awards to these deserving women and to celebrate their achievements.

Christchurch/Ōtautahi Awards Ceremony: 20th of June

The first NHWT Award Ceremony in 2014 was held on a brilliantly sunny winter afternoon at University of Canterbury Te Ao Mārama. The two awardees, Alice Downie and Sandra Macfarlane, are both enrolled in the Bachelor of Social Work Programme at the Christchurch Polytechnic Institute of Technology (CPIT). Tutors, as well as nearly 50 whanau and friends, donors, supporters of New Horizons for Women Trust and representatives of other women's organisations attended.

Rosemary Du Plessis, NHWT Trustee, welcomed everyone. Mayor Lianne Dalziel congratulated the recipients on their awards and highlighted how the achievements of individuals often require the support and collaboration of

others. Dr Liz Gordon spoke about why second chance education was important for women. She argued that tertiary education was not only a means of acquiring qualifications and skills, but a way to widen your horizons and enable personal transformation.

The awards were presented by Danielle O'Halloran, President of PACIFCA and Yvonne Crichton-Hill, Senior Lecturer and Department Coordinator in Social Work and Human Services at University of Canterbury. Alice Downie and Sandra Macfarlane each offered an impressive mihi at the beginning of their acceptance speeches. They spoke movingly about the life circumstances that had prompted their decisions to enter the Social Work programme at CPIT, and what engaged them personally about the training they were receiving and the work they were doing on placements within community organisations and stage agencies.

Afternoon tea was provided by the Zonta Club South Christchurch. The foyer of Te Ao Mārama was decorated by a wonderful tapa cloth provided by Danielle O'Halloran and PACIFICA. Moana Matthes, who worked for the the Macmillan Brown Centre for Pacific Studies for many years and assisted with previous NHWT Award ceremonies, was remembered with affection and gratitude at this award ceremony.

Dunedin Awards Ceremony: 22nd of June

On 22 June we had a small gathering in the St John Church hall to present two of the awards. On the day, Clare Curran, Member of Parliament for Dunedin South, provided an opening address, outlining the Labour Party's stance on women's issues. Following this, Dawn Ibbotson, one of our very special, longstanding scholarship donors, was presented with some flowers in honour of her 100th birthday and our Chair, Mavis Shuker spoke about NHWT and our upcoming plans.

Ms Ibbotson presented her second chance education award to Mrs Lara Marshall, who is finishing a degree in Bachelor of Nursing, and Mavis presented a Graduate Women Wellington research award to Mrs Jane Adams. Jane also spoke, explaining her research in the history of infertility in New Zealand. This was a fascinating talk which provided an excellent insight into an important part of our history.

Hamilton Awards Ceremony: 22nd of July

Six Second Chance Education Awards, grants to help women with study and/or living expenses, were presented at the Hamilton Ceremony, held at WINTEC. Recipients attended with proud families and friends to receive their award and share their journey of learning and obstacles that they were overcoming to achieve academic success. Three women were first in their family to go to university; they are the trail-blazers for their families.

An inspiring address was given by Sue Moroney, Hamilton-based Labour MP, who shared her own educational experience and her belief in increasing women's participation in tertiary studies. She, however, reminded us all that gaining a tertiary qualification does not close the pay equity gap. Sponsors included: The NZ Federation of Women's

Wellington Awards Ceremony: 24th of July

Ten awards were presented including Second Chance Education, Research Awards, Opportunity awards as well as special awards. These included the Sonja Davies Peace Award that went to Donna Swift for her work that has developed from 'The Girls Project: An investigation of girls' use of violent and anti-social behaviour'. Donna is now creating resources for educators and caregivers to enhance the well-being of teenage girls.

Our Chair, Mavis Shuker, provided a warm welcome and a selection of representatives from the award sponsors were on hand to present eight awards to recipients from across the region. Special guest, Dame Cath Tizard ONZ, GCMG, GCVO, DBE, QSO, DStJ and former Mayor of Auckland was on hand to present Dr. Pantea Farvid with the SROW (Society for Research on Women) Research Award for her project entitled 'Media Literacy for Teen Girls in Aotearoa'. We were honoured to have Maire Leadbeater, daughter of Elsie Locke, NZ Human Rights and Peace activist, to present the SROW Elsie Locke Award to Elizabeth Luke for her Research project which will evaluate how NHWT awards have benefited women. The Chenery Memorial Second Chance Award was presented by Vicky Mee, National President of BPW (Business & Professional Women Inc.) to Bev Clark, an Auckland based Weltec student. Zonta West Auckland's President Rhondda Paice presented the Award they sponsor to Luti Veletaloola, a nursing student from MIT, followed by the the presentation of the NZFGW North

Guest speaker Dr Melinda Webber describes herself firstly as a mama, sister, daughter, friend and partner, lucky to be loved in return for each of these roles. Secondly she is a proud wahine with proud Te Arawa and Ngāpuhi whakapapa (lineage) - Her connections to these places shape who she is and what she aspires to do in life and work. And thirdly, she is an academic and a researcher at The University of Auckland in the fields of Adolescent social psychology, racial ethnic identify construction, Māori gifted learners, Māori success and qualitative research methodologies. This was a fitting ending to a great afternoon of smiles, tears and song as well as inspirational stories and a celebration of fantastic women.

Sponsor Spotlight: FW Trust

The FW Trust was founded in 2009 by a retired teacher and published writer who overcame a number of obstacles to complete a Ph.D when she was in her seventies.

The founder recognises from her own experience that there are many reasons why women do not realise their full potential and succeed in gaining a qualification on their first attempt. She feels that how women cope with this and respond is what matters. Based on this, her wish is to give a Second Chance opportunity to women who are New Zealand citizens and over forty years of age. Her focus is on women who have a "get on with it" attitude and "the guts to try again and to keep on going until they are thoroughly – and honestly – satisfied that they have used their capabilities to the utmost to work towards a qualification".

The founder is supported by a small group of trustees who are entrusted with ensuring the founder's philosophy and wishes are promoted.

Research Spotlight: Dr Lucy Burkitt

Dr Lucy Burkitt is the recipient of the 2014 Margaret L Bailey Science Award.

I am a soil scientist with 14 years' experience in Australia and New Zealand. I started my research career in Victoria, Australia with a PhD focussing on improving the efficiency of phosphorus fertiliser use in pasture systems. Since then, I have led projects and published papers in international journals studying nutrient management under intensive pasture systems at farm and catchment scale, phosphorus uptake and runoff following different fertiliser strategies and phosphorus risk modelling.

We moved to New Zealand in 2012 when my husband was offered a job at Massey University and so I am currently reestablishing my research career in our new home. My recent research has involved establishing a stream water quality monitoring program and researching the effects of animal treading on nutrient runoff, leaching and denitrification in New Zealand hill country.

I am extremely grateful for the Margaret L Bailey Science Award. This award will be used for the collection, processing and analysis of water quality samples from our hill country surface run off experiment.

Awardee Spotlight: Yvone Chiku

We had the great pleasure of meeting Yvone and her beautiful family at the Wellington ceremony. She shared some of the challenges she has faced moving to New Zealand from Zimbabwe and how her experiences have motivated her to pursue a career in nursing.

As a married mother of three children, I have had many challenges and 'ups and downs' in my life. I had given up any idea of going back to study after such a long time away from school. I took up work as a caregiver in a number of different nursing homes as I was not prepared to face going to school again.

I had passion, without motivation until I eventually undertook some foundation studies at Whitirea, and achieved A grades! I have moved on to the Bachelor of Nursing course and I have continued to succeed academically. Financial constraints did make this very difficult at times. The New Horizons Award has helped to ease this burden.
