

A WORD FROM THE CHAIR -CONTINUED

Awards for 2023

In 2023 the Trust planned to align decision making and payment of awards to the academic year, this meant that applications made in 2023 would be for courses in 2024.

Improvements to the application process (using a strengths-based approach and simplifying application requirements) resulted in the highest number of applications ever received (732 in total) with a very small number of ineligible applications (13 in total). The number of awards offered has remained relatively static over the past 3 years and the increased demand for degree and research awards will result in a future focus to grow our current offering.

Award ceremonies continue to be the highlight of our year and are planned to be held in Wellington, Tokoroa, Christchurch and Auckland.

Recognising the importance of our legacy

The Trust will continue to develop our historical archive of the Trust from its inception, this is a valuable resource which records Trust activities and governance roles.

Operational Resourcing

As a not-for-profit organisation, operational resourcing is an ongoing challenge. The Trust acknowledges the hard work of our operations team Ani Stace and Amanda Earl who provide significant support to assist the Trust to achieve its strategic goals.

Planning for the Future

As we prepare for our Annual General Meeting and my last as Chair, I am excited about the diversity, skills and experience reflected in our Board composition and its readiness to lift our organisational performance to new levels.

Relationships remain at the core of what we do, strengthening existing relationships and creating opportunities for new partnerships and award sponsors will be a focus for the 2024 calendar year.

My thanks to current trustees, Robyn Dixon (Deputy Chair), Johanna Cogle, Frances Sherriff, Marie Schmidt, Karen Shepherd, Margot van de Water, we are united in our purpose and focused on the end goal.

In 2024 we will be joined by Anna Whalan-Bell who will fill the last vacant trustee position.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

2023 was a successful year for Hine Kahukura. We have had an increased focus on our awards offering, including making the awards process simpler for applicants. The result was a hugely successful awards round for awards given out in early 2024.

The Trust had an operational deficit in 2023 of \$73,111. The Board is comfortable with this operational loss, as it is being funded by equity reserves put aside for this purpose. The Trust is actively pursuing other revenue options, including grant funding, to support these operational expenses.

The Statement of Financial Position remains healthy, and we received strong revenue results from our investment portfolio.

Most importantly, Hine Kahukura distributed \$137,000 to women in order to support their education this year. The Board acknowledges the significant amount of work completed by the Trust Manager and Operations Coordinator to ensure the funds were distributed in a timely manner.





AWARDS & APPLICATIONS UPDATE

In the first half of 2023 we completed an extensive review of our applications and awards systems, and as a result implemented a new process in the 2023 awards round. The changes were based on feedback from across all our stakeholder groups including current and past applicants, and volunteers serving on assessment panels. The major changes were:

- Alignment of NHWT:HK award cycle with the academic year. This has resulted in awards being made prior to the start of the academic year. This allows successful applicants the ability to make decisions and to plan their year accordingly, knowing they have the finances necessary to do so.
- Changes to the application form and platform. A major change has been the shift to a simplified form and a strengths-based application process, whereby applicants are given some parameters within which to tell their story, including how they came to study and their future plans. As a result we had a record number of applications (over 700). Further, previously we have had a significant number of ineligible applications, largely due to the nature of forms and the difficulties applicants encountered in had completing it. This year we introduced a new platform and along with this and the changes to the form only 13 applications were deemed ineligible.

Now we have another challenge in that, while we presented 54 award in the 2023 round we had many more fundable applications. In light of this we will be actively seeking to increase the number of awards we can offer.

Finally, my thanks to the Trust staff, trustees and stakeholders, including past trustees, panellists and applicants for their input and feedback. It has been invaluable.
