From the Chair



Since our last newsletter many of you will have celebrated Suffrage Day (September 19). This significant day in New

Zealand's history not only provides the opportunity for individuals and organisations to celebrate New Zealand's suffrage achievements, but to also remind ourselves we need to continually look for ways to make further progress to benefit women.

We know our awards programme benefits women. From small beginnings we now provide an increasing number and diversity of awards. In 2015 we provided awards worth over \$140,000 to 41 women, details are provided later in the newsletter and on our website.

On behalf of the Trust, congratulations to all our awardees. My thanks go to the Trustees and their supporters for organising the awards ceremonies, to the ceremony sponsors, and to the inspirational speakers who gave their time to share their magic at our ceremonies. And on behalf of the Trust and award recipients, thank you to our sponsors, donors and award selection panels; we couldn't provide the awards without your generous support.

In the last newsletter I mentioned we had commissioned research to answer the question 'to what extent do our awards benefit women?' A summary of the report prepared by Elizabeth Luke is now available on our website www.newhorizonsforwomen.org.nz Snippets from the report are provided below. The benefit achieved from our awards is both tangible & intangible. Tangible benefits include financial assistance for study and family-related expenses which then relieves stress and enables recipients to focus on their study or research:

"I was really finding it hard to make ends meet. I couldn't cover my weekly costs and so lots of things were not taken care of such as car maintenance".

The intangible benefits are extensive. Many spoke of how having others believe in them enhanced their self-worth and gave them courage to make life-changing decisions for themselves and their family. *"I am not entirely sure I would have achieved this had I not received the Award. NHWT believed in me when I needed someone to most".*

2016 promises to be an exciting year. We plan to extend our awards programme further with the addition of targeted awards for Maori women and migrant women, plus more research awards. Our refreshed brand will be launched at the 2016 Annual Meeting. Behind the scenes we continue to make improvements in how we govern and run the Trust; these improvements are described in the Strategic Plan which will be available from our website later in 2015. Hamilton Awards Ceremony, 17th July, 2015. The Bill Gallagher Centre at Wintec was the venue. Guest speaker, Anjum Rahman spoke on the effects of isolation on women. Our awardees spoke consistently of the huge difference that their award would make to their lives, not just financially, but as recognition of their potential. The Hon. Louise Upston closed the ceremony, where she acknowledged the considerable service that the Trust provided to women and to New Zealand society.





Christchurch/Ōtautahi Awards Ceremony,

18th July, 2015. Danielle O'Halloran, President of the Christchurch Branch of PACIFICA in 2014, spoke about why second-chance education was important for women, and particularly Pacifica women. The Hon Lianne Dalziel presented the awards and each awardee spoke about their early lives and the discouragement that each of them experienced when they wanted to pursue education that was not defined as study for girls.

Dunedin Awards Ceremony, 19th July, 2015. The Dunedin award ceremony was held in rather cold conditions in the Te Tumu Annex of the University of Otago, Dunedin. Three awards were presented – the Teupoko'ina Utanga Morgan Memorial Second-Chance Award, awarded to Amanda Taylor; the Dawn & Arthur Ibbotson Second-Chance Award awarded to Rhiannone Robb; and the Dawn & Arthur Ibbotson Foundation Award awarded to Kerri-Anne Hayes. The guest speaker, Pearl Matahiki, Tumuaki/Manager, Māori Centre was inspiring, speaking of her own life story with the strong message of the importance of relationships and mentors in life and of seizing every opportunity.





Wellington Awards Ceremony, 23rd July, 2015

Ten awards were presented in front of whanau and friends in the Hunter Common Room at Victoria University of Wellington. Five Second-Chance Awards, two Foundation Study Awards, two Research Awards and the Ria McBride Public Service Management Award were presented by various sponsors to well-deserving students. Mary Mowbray introduced a new research award *The Margaret Shields Research Award*, and guest speaker, Sandi Beatie, former Deputy State Services Commissioner outlined her career choices and changes – a positive example of accepting challenges and succeeding.



Palmerston North Awards Ceremony, 24th July, 2015

The Palmerston North Awards Ceremony was held at the Universal College of Learning (UCOL), Palmerston North. We presented a record number of awards this year to women undertaking tertiary education at institutions within the Manawatu-Wanganui region – 6 awards for secondchance education and one research award.



Auckland Awards Ceremony, 8th August, 2015. The Auckland ceremony was hosted by Auckland University of Technology (AUT) at their South campus in Manukau, which is idyllically located in the former Carter Holt Harvey estate. The opening address was presented by TV sports presenter Jenny May Coffin. Jenny May spoke of her battles in representing NZ in both netball and touch football as well as her journey in journalism and what hard work was invested to accomplish these roles. We hosted over 100 people with awardees, sponsors and of course their whānau.



Award Spotlight: Dr. Lucy Burkitt, the Margaret L. Bailey Science Award

The Margaret L. Bailey Science Research Award recipient, Soil Scientist Dr Lucy Burkitt from Massey University, reports that her study - quantifying nutrient and sediment losses in surface runoff generated from grazed hill country within the Manawatu catchment - is progressing very well, despite only having six runoff events (not enough intense or prolonged storm events!) where they were able to collect water and analyse the amount of nutrients and sediment being lost from their experimental plots. The data collected to date are assisting to unravel the complex role hydrology plays in nutrient and sediment loss in these tricky hill country environments.

This support from the award has and will continue to allow her to collect a full year of runoff data which will be invaluable in providing base line data from a permanent pasture system. These data will then allow them to compare the impact of land use change from pasture to cropping on nutrient and sediment loss.

The data and momentum that this study has generated (thanks to NHWT funding support) has attracted a Masters student who will study the effect of cropping these steep hill country soils on nutrient and sediment loss. Hill country farmers searching for higher quality feed to finish their lambs are turning to cropping in steep marginal country to increase their returns. However, the effects of these practices on nutrient and sediment loss have not been studied, despite the risk they pose to water quality.

It hasn't been easy for Dunedin woman Rhianonne Robb, juggling fulltime study with caring for two children over the past two and a-half years. But her hard work has been recognised by the New Horizons for Women Trust as the latest recipient of the Dawn and Arthur Ibbotson Second Chance Award.

Ms Robb was presented with the award in July, but Mrs Ibbotson was unable to attend. Mrs Ibbotson said previously she had given to only one award, but this year she wanted to give more. "It makes such a difference to their lives," she said. Mrs Ibbotson, not shy in acknowledging her longevity, said she liked giving something back. "Life has been pretty good to me and I'd like to return it."

Mrs Ibbotson studied at the University of Otago from 1933-37 and has spent much of her life volunteering time to help others.

She was made a Commander of the British Empire in 1977 and awarded the New Zealand 1990 Commemoration Medal in recognition of her dedication to the community.

Ms Robb is in her final semester studying educational psychology extramurally through Massey University. She is grateful for the scholarship, as it had been a struggle to bring up her two daughters on only the income of two students.

The other award sponsored by Mrs Ibbotson, the Dawn and Arthur Ibbotson Foundation Award, was given to Kerri-Anne Hayes, of Dunedin.
